Obituary: David Temple

It is with sadness that Sidmouth Croquet Club records the death of David Temple, one of our more active and influential members.

After retiring from a long career as a veterinary David, and his wife Nancy, retired to Sidmouth. Here, at Nancy's urging, he joined the Club and they both became major 'players' in the Club's activities. Their names appear on many club trophies, both AC and GC, reflecting their growing development as proficient croquet players.



However, for most of us, David will be remembered as one of those key members on whom many clubs depend. The always willing volunteer, the one who sees a job needs to be done so just gets on with it. He coached new members, turned his hand to practical issues, like producing a very artistic 'tea and coffee perambulator' for tournaments, and many other unheralded jobs. The mundane tasks that are actually so important and form the solid base of a successful club. He served on the committee, member and Chairman and was ever available as a 'sounding board' helping to ensure the Club worked for all.

David was also a reliable member of the General Management Committee which oversees the running of the Sidmouth Cricket, Tennis, Croquet [and then] Hockey Club. He fought the croquet section's corner but, also, was able to take the overarching view on the best way forward for the club as a whole. His strengths were recognised when he was asked to serve as the main club's president. Having initiated the lawns watering system, orchestrated the funding and seen the installation come into use he was, indeed, a useful, multi-talented man to have in any organisation.

For these and many other reasons both he and Nancy were finally recognised with CA Diplomas in 2020. Unfortunately, this coincided with David's major decline in health and his final years were difficult for him. He died peacefully in the early hours of 20th September with Nancy and his daughter, Sarah, at his side.

David was a true friend of the Club and a dedicated family man Our condolences go to Nancy and his four children; Sarah, Kate, Rachel and Richard and his 12 grandchildren.

SWF Autumn Short Croquet Team Tournament Budleigh Salterton 8 – 10 October 2022

Another weekend of enjoyable croquet when our annual Autumn tournament took place at Budleigh Salterton. I am very grateful for the immaculate lawns provided by the club and to Chris Donovan

for his management over the weekend.

Once again there were a few

problems putting teams together and the changes at the last moment did cause a few fraught moments in the week leading up to the competition. However, with the aid of a few quests, we did

manage to get 25 teams playing, so a full complement in five divisions.



Division 1

The standard in this division was very high. All teams had a 2P or 3P player at No. 1, and the highest handicap No. 2 was 1.5.

Kington Langley Bruins were attempting to defend the trophy and they made a good start winning 7 out of 8 in the first two rounds. However, Glamorgan had a bye in the first round and they met in the third round which resulted in a 3-1 win for Glamorgan, with Taunton Terriers also closing the gap.

A 3-1 win for Glamorgan over Taunton in Round 4 effectively ended Taunton's hopes, and with Kington Langley sitting out, Glamorgan drew level going in to the last round. Kington Langley drew 2-2 with Taunton and Glamorgan were standing at 2-1 over Nailsea Trendlewood with the last game still on court and Glamorgan several hoops behind. A shoot-out at the peg looked inevitable, but Glamorgan, in the guise of Kevin Ham, took his backward ball to peg, and time was called.

Both players were now on peg and 6, Nailsea shot and missed and Kevin scored the golden hoop to give Glamorgan overall victory.

In the relegation battle, Nailsea's 3-1 victory in Round 4 over Budleigh Salterton Roquets proved vital.

Glamorgan 11, Kington Langley Bruins 10, Taunton Terriers 8, Nailsea Trendlewood 6, Budleigh Salterton Roquets 5 Paul Pristavec (Glamorgan) and Paul Arbos (Nailsea) had 4 wins out of 4.

Division 2

Another very exciting finish for the honours, which in fact went to a shoot-out at the peg, and also a last-round relegation battle.

Going in to the last round, Sidmouth Fortfield were two wins ahead of Kington Langley Aardvarks but had to sit out the last round, and Bristol Blues were a further two wins behind. It appeared that the title was between Sidmouth and Kington Langley, but Bristol had different ideas. The last round saw them beat Kington Langley 4-0 to draw level with Sidmouth and leave Kington Langley still languishing two wins behind.

And so to the shoot-out. By now, one Sidmouth player had gone home, but this did not deter them, and with their three remaining players won the shoot-out to gain promotion.

Relegation was decided in the last round as Camerton and Peasedown and Cornwall both with 4 wins had to play each other. Camerton and Peasedown won 3-1.

Sidmouth Fortfield 10, Bristol Blues 10, Kington Langley Aardvarks 8, Camerton and Peasedown 7, Cornwall 5

Des Honey (Cornwall) and Bob Whiffen (Bristol) won all four games.

Division 3

Another very close finish. Going in to the last round there were 4 teams on 6 wins and Bath on 8. Unfortunately for Sidmouth Blackmore, they had to sit out this round, so they were effectively out of the running, and, unless one of the other matches finished 4-0, they were going to be relegated.

Exeter A and Taunton Tiggers drew 2-2, so it was down to the match between Bristol Allsorts and Bath to determine the winner. Bristol won 3-1 to set up a shoot-out for the title, which they went on to win.

Bristol Allsorts 9, Bath 9, Taunton Tiggers and Exeter A 8, Sidmouth Blackmore 6

Division 4

This was not a close finish. In fact, Budleigh Salterton Mallets had won with a round to spare.

This did not look to be the likely outcome after two rounds, when Mallets, Budleigh Salterton Rushes and Sidmouth Connaught all had 4 wins, and East Dorset had 2 but had played only one match. But then the Mallets took control and won their next two matches 4-0. They were able to sit out the last round comfortable in the knowledge that no other team could catch them.

Sidmouth Connaught beat Lym Valley A in the relegation shoot-out, scoring the only hit on the thirteenth shot.

Budleigh Salterton Mallets 12, East Dorset and Budleigh Salteron Rushes 8, Sidmouth Connaught 6 Lym Valley A 6

Rosemary Bradshaw (Budleigh Salterton Rushes) and David Fuller (East Dorset) won all four games.

Division 5

Yet again there was a very competitive ending to this division. After 4 rounds, Nailsea had 10 wins, and Kington Langley Coyotes and Exeter B had 9. Exeter had to sit out the last round so Kington Langley were to play Nailsea in the title decider. A very tense match saw a 2-2 draw resulting in Nailsea as the champions.

The wooden spoon was decided in the last round when Winterborne Valley beat Lym Valley B 3-1. Lym Valley struggled the whole day, but I am eternally grateful to them for putting out a second team to enable us to have a full complement of 5 divisions.

Nailsea 12, Kington Langley 11, Exeter B 9, Winterborne Valley 7, Lym Valley B 1 Brian Roynon and Terry Young (both Nailsea) and John Grimshaw (Kington Langley Coyotes) won all 4 games.

GC Inter-Counties Revisited

Many thanks to Keith Southern for completing the picture for us:

Issue 38 (September) of Cygnet carried an article about this year's GC Inter-Counties competition focussing on the success of Devon and Somerset in gaining promotion to Division 1 for next year. In so doing the performance of another of the region's teams was overlooked. Dorset finished 3rd (of 12) in this year's Division 1 with 7 wins from 11 matches, headed only by the might of Nottinghamshire and Yorkshire / Durham.

But it was a roller-coaster ride, winning the first three matches, losing the next four, and then finishing with four straight wins including a victory against Yorkshire / Durham. With a very small pool of strong players on which to call, the overall result showed Dorset punching well above their weight; based on the strength of players participating a mid-table result (5th to 8th) might have been expected.

Each match consisted of one doubles and two singles games, so the squad of 5 permitted some rotation. The players involved (Jonathan Powe, Steve Leonard, David Kendrick, Keith Southern and Michelle Leonard) are all members of the East Dorset club although most are also members of other clubs in the South West Federation.

Federation League: Winterborne Valley complete the 'Double' again!

On a cool but sunny Saturday in late September Winterborne Valley (WV) completed the 'double' of winning both the GC Level Play and the Federation AC Handicap finals for the second year in succession.

The AC Federation League is the SWF's oldest competition dating back to 1985. During this time, a wide variety of clubs have won this competition including both finalists – Bath (winners three times the latest being in 2017) and WV (twice before 2022, once under the guise of Kingston Maurward in 1998).



This year's final was played at Cheltenham between two teams of three players, all of whom had to travel some distance to reach the venue – the WV players from South Dorset and two of the Bath team coming to Cheltenham from Cornwall and Keswick).

Playing on green and relatively slow courts, the players quickly acclimatised and some interesting and entertaining games ensued. In the morning doubles, Paul Francis & Neil Pinker (Bath) were up against Steve Leonard and Neal Unitt-Jones, conceding 4 bisques. It took a little time for both sides to get going with the game being eventually timed out with WV ahead 19 to 11.

Again, in the accompanying singles, the game was timed out with Martin Strange (WV), who had 11 bisques) just ahead of Peter Miles 19-16. In the afternoon singles, two games went to peg-out: Martin Strange completed two wins out of two beating Paul Francis +25 while only using half of his bisque allocation of 8 while in the other game Steve Leonard eventually beat Peter Miles +7 with both players constructing good breaks including spectacular peels.

The final afternoon singles timed out with Neal Unitt-Jones beating Neil Pinker 23-19 thus completing a 5-0 win for WV who completed the 'double' and returned south with this venerable shield which now has very little space left for the winner's 'mini' shield. Many congratulations to WV and commiserations to Bath.

Thanks go to Cheltenham for hosting the final and especially to Sarah Hayes who ensured that all the preparations were in excellent order and who acted as the referee for this important match.

Intermediate League

After the early morning hoop setters had recorded a temperature of 5°C, the sun got into a competition with a cool northerly breeze, with the result that layers were being donned and shed all through the day.

The opening exchanges were cagey and many hoop attempts were either blobbed or over-run by several yards – maybe reflecting 'final nerves'. Margaret and Chris sparred for over half an hour before the first hoop was scored, but eventually Margaret got going with a nice break and eventually ran out a winner on time. Ted and John were meanwhile progressing a hoop or two at a time. Eventually Ted's six bisques ran out, but he managed to keep in the game with some excellent hitting in. The result was in doubt to the end, but eventually John's greater experience counted and he got home +2 on time. In the doubles (Ian and Caroline vs. Mike and Neil) both pairs struggled to get going, but Mike and Neil were the eventual victors on time. East Dorset led 2-1 at lunch.

In the afternoon the sun got to work on the lawns, making conditions quite challenging, and quite a few balls went off the court in croquet strokes, to the good-natured frustration of their strikers.

However, John got off to a flying start against Caroline with a 4th turn break of 5 hoops, which proved to be the game-winner, as thereafter they traded hoops, with John ending up +4 on time winner. Ted continued his excellent hitting from the morning, eventually overcoming Neil, while Ian played steadily to defeat Chris, these last two games being the only ones of the day to be



completed with a peg-out. This left the score at 3-3, and with most of the players and spectators around lawn 2, we anxiously awaited news of the final game between Margaret and Mike, some 80 yards away on lawn 1. Margaret had drawn ahead with some useful turns, and in the end, Mike needed peels on his final turn which weren't forthcoming. So, Margaret ran out the winner and the final score was 4-3 to Kington Langley.

Congratulations to Kington Langley, commiserations to East Dorset, and well done to both teams on a close match that was played in a competitive but friendly spirit.

However, the overall result of 13:2 to Winterborne Valley disguises the fact of several 7:5 games so the match certainly presented its excitements during the day.



In the last issue of Cygnet we drew your attention to a murder mystery set on a croquet lawn: A Rush on the Ultimate by H R F Keating.

Brigit got back to us from Nailsea: "I like your literary allusions - have read several H.R.F. Keating books but haven't come across his croquet tale before."



She went on to tackle the mystery quote:

The Lord Chancellor of England was a small, fat, ugly man with steel-rimmed spectacles which gave him the schoolboy look which led to his nickname 'The Owl of the Remove'.
