#### **Obituary**

#### Shaun Carter (1959-2022)

We have learnt that Shaun died recently. Chris Williams (Glamorgan), remembers him.

Shaun Carter first played croquet at Plymouth in the early 90's and quickly became a regular tournament player on the South West circuit playing tournaments at Budleigh, Sidmouth, East Dorset, Cheltenham, Nailsea and Bristol, reaching a handicap of 0. In fact, it appeared to be that he was a member of most clubs in Devon and Somerset at some point.

Shaun represented Wales against New Zealand in 1996 and played in the 1997 AC World Championship in Bunbury, Australia. He also represented Glamorgan a couple of times in the AC Inter County Championship in Sussex and played in the Selectors' Weekend four times between 1995 and 1998.

Shaun edited the South West Federation's annual newsletter, the SWAN, for a couple of years in the late 90s, before handing over to Sue Mackay, who held the post for many years.

In his youth Shaun had played hockey as a goalkeeper. After his croquet career ended Shaun took up white ball golf with his wife Jo and moved back to Cornwall.

Shaun passed away in Cornwall in April 2022 after a long battle against cancer.

#### **Obituary**

#### Neil Morrison 1942 - 2023

We mentioned in the last issue that Neil Morrison, a previous Treasurer of the SWF had died. Tony Mayer, a fellow Swindon member (and Chair of the SWF), remembers him.

It is with great sadness that we announce the passing of Neil Morrison, a stalwart of the Swindon Croquet Club and the former Treasurer of the South West Federation.

Neil had been an ever-present figure at the Croquet Club since he joined in 2005. In fact, most days would find Neil at the Club, always dressed in whites, carrying out a wide variety of tasks in maintaining the courts. He was usually to be seen constantly smoking and was renowned for his sweet tooth to the extent that he took coffee in his sugar rather than the reverse!

Before joining Swindon, Neil had also played at Phyllis Court and Blewbury, indulging in his passion for AC, although of course, he was also a very adept GC player. At Swindon, he became an integral part of the committee taking on various roles throughout the years including being the overall green keeper, setting up the Club's website and becoming its treasurer. His greatest and lasting contribution was his skill in raising funds from grants amounting to some £140,000 for new lawns, club house and equipment stores when the Borough Council handed over maintenance responsibility to the Club.

As an architect, he provided the designs for the new buildings. For his services to the Swindon Croquet Club, he was presented with the Pride of Swindon award in 2011 and, in 2013, he received the CA Diploma for his services to croquet.

Neil was an excellent coach for beginners, improvers as well as the more established players. Many of us recall about Neil being 'on our shoulder' when we decided whether clear a ball or go for the hoop and having chosen the wrong option, one would look around to see Neil sitting outside the clubhouse with a cup of coffee and a cigarette and he'd be shaking his head and smiling.

From the day he joined, Neil was deeply involved in the Club's 'Taking Croquet to the Community' and believed strongly in this part of the Club's ethos as well as its competitive role.

More recently, he led the negotiations with the Borough Council for our planned further expansion with an additional two lawns and ancillary facilities as part of the exciting development of the Moredon Sports Hub for cricket, cycling, croquet and football. He was always adept at ferreting out opportunities for the club's and his own ambitions for us.

At the regional level he was a well-known and respected figure. In 2018, he was persuaded to take on the Treasurer role at the South West Federation for a few years to help the Federation fill this vacancy.

Our fondest memories of Neil will be as a good friend associated with his passion for and commitment to croquet.

John Grimshaw, an ex- SWF League Secretary and current organiser of the SC tournaments recalls: I persuaded Neil to become Treasurer of the SWF and to join the Wiltshire County team. His input to croquet was exceptional, and he guided the Swindon club through a transitional period when they were developing their site. A huge loss to the sport.


## New CA Councillor / Croquet England Trustee for the South-West Federation — Stuart M. Smith


Congratulations to Stuart on his appointment to CA Council. He introduces himself here:

#### **East Dorset regain Murphy Shield**

A SW Federation club, East Dorset, has become the second to win the trophy on three occasions, Watford being the other. East Dorset had won in 2019 at their first attempt in the competition and had retained the trophy in 2020.

The Murphy Shield is the second-tier national inter-club GC KO competition organised by the CA for teams of four with a total handicap of at least 12. The match format is one doubles and six singles rubbers, each best of three games. In the 2023 final, played at Cheltenham, East Dorset defeated Chester 5-2, having beaten Cheam, Sussex County and Phyllis Court in previous rounds, generally by comfortable margins.



The winning East Dorset team was Andy Dochniak, Keith Southern, Tim Hughes, and Sandra Allan – *see photo* - Keith and Sandra had also been members of the 2019 winning team. Another regular member of the team had been Mark Hamann. He was part of the final winning teams in both 2019 and 2020 and had played in all the early rounds this year with a 100% record, but a recent handicap reduction had made him ineligible for the final.

East Dorset established a 2-1 lead in the morning rubbers by winning the doubles in two games (having done this in all this year's matches) and sharing the two singles. In the afternoon they won the singles 3-1 with the four rubbers all completed in two games with victory going to the lower handicap player in each.

The challenge now for East Dorset is to become the first club to win the trophy on four occasions.

Beautiful sunny conditions and perfect lawns saw two very strong teams facing each other. Four of the eight players (see photo right) had minus handicaps, including two - 2s and a minus 2½.

Cheltenham were 2-1 up at lunchtime, having lost the doubles but won two singles, both +1 on time. This included a game



between Wendy Wu of Cheltenham and Jonathan Powe of East Dorset in which Wendy peeled Jonathan's ball through Rover and then pegged it out. He hit in when Wendy had both clips on the peg and ran a 3-ball break to Rover to leave the score at 24-24 at full time. Wendy then made a very long roquet and managed to peg one ball out for a 25-24 win.

There was plenty of work for the referee (me) though not always to both players' satisfaction.



Cheltenham went 3-1 up after a majestic display by James Death to beat Jonathan +25. Christine Rice beat Richard Marriage and David Fuller beat Sarah Hayes to level the match 3-3 with just the singles between Mike Rice and Wendy Wu to be resolved. Mike won this to seal the victory for East Dorset, who will therefore be invited to represent the South West Federation in the Secretary's Shield in 2024.

Llandaff, who had played a semi-final in torrential rain the previous weekend, benefitted from a nett 51 extra strokes over the Swanage team despite them sporting their magnificent team colours. All the games were keenly fought with many going to the 13<sup>th</sup> hoop. The match consisted of four rounds of a doubles and three singles followed by a final round of singles.



By lunchtime, after two rounds, Llandaff had established a commanding 6-2 lead but the afternoon session saw Swanage claw their way back into contention so that the final round saw Llandaff clinging on to a 9-7 lead. However, the Welsh team finished strongly running with a final score of 12-8 to them to win the Shield for a second time, having won previously in 2019. Budleigh Salterton prevail after 17 years to win the GC Handicap Final in the pouring rain.

Although originally planned to be staged at Swindon, the final was transferred to Kington Langley due to the vehicle access problems at Swindon due to the construction of a major sports hub in which Swindon CC will be a part. So, thanks go to Kington Langley (KL) for stepping in to host this final. Special thanks go to Margaret Murray and Fiona Hancock from KL who kept everyone well supplied with hot drinks and mountains of cake!

The final was between two previous winners, Budleigh and Cheltenham, both having won their semi-finals ten days previously. Clearly the long journey from the Devon coast had not affected the Budleigh team who shot ahead and, after two rounds of double-banked singles and doubles, were ahead by 7-1.



Then the weather intervened with torrential rain coming down in the proverbial 'stair-rods' and drenching all the players. The next rounds of singles were played in appalling conditions with standing water on the edges of the courts and very slow surface with the result that it took two and sometimes three shots on the long hoops (1 & 2 and 3 & 4\$) to get from one hoop to the other.

Cheltenham fought back in the singles but after two rounds of singles, Budleigh had established an unassailable winning lead having won 11 games. Both captains agreed that the conditions were such that further play was impossible and the final result was an 11-4 win for Budleigh. Budleigh, who were the first winners of the Shield in 2006 had reclaimed the trophy after a wait of 17 years!



The rain eased off enough for the presentation and for us all to gather our belongings and race to our cars without getting too wet. Thanks to both teams for keenly fought games of croquet played in a friendly spirit, congratulations to Budleigh, commiserations to Cheltenham and thanks to Kington Langley, our gracious hosts.

#### **Forestalling**

You will recall that in the last issue Chris Frew raised concerns at not being able to forestall play when an opponent is experiencing memory loss or cognitive impairment. This got Klim Seabright (Cheltenham) thinking . . .

Thanks to Chris Frew for raising this very sensitive issue. I offer the following thoughts but I emphasise they are intended for debate, because I don't really know the answers. Let us strike out in two directions.

Perhaps a player wishing to continue to play AC could be encouraged to play a shorter version of the game? There is a half game, an 18-point game, Short Croquet or One Ball? Perhaps a half game presents less of a sequential challenge? Ditto One Ball? The only way we are going to find out is in the unlikely scenario of a club member, who acknowledges a problem, being observed playing the shorter game by a Coach.

Could an exemption from Law 23.3 be considered? It would be impractical to have medical certificates but a respected club member could sign off on this allowing an opponent to forestall – Handicapper? Coach? etc.

OK, I hear someone say "that puts the none exempt player at a disadvantage". What about the exempt player taking the 'wrong' ball to one of the GC penalty spots and replaying (or playing the correct ball)? Should it be suggested that they play only GC? Before anyone accuses me of being patronising to the player or GC ... bear with ...

I have a feeling that it is easier to follow a clockwise and anticlockwise circuit in GC. I base this on absolutely no primary evidence at all ... just a gut feeling.

I think our sport contains quite a few Medics and/or Clinical Psychologists and would welcome their more expert input. In the spirit of inclusivity and research I would urge the Federation to consult such experts within our sport to consider various approaches. It is a bit like dreading the day when someone tells me that I should give up driving, part of my enjoyment of the sport continues to be visiting some croquet clubs in splendid settings.

Klim then had some further thoughts . . .

- Might there be some kind of adaptation of a simple system which I see used by some GC players? They use elasticised hair bands to keep count of hoops run. These they slide up or down the shaft of the mallet. I am sure it is possible to obtain hair bands of different colours. I am not quite sure how this might work but trial and error?
- What about technology? There seems to be an App for most things?
- Something like those things you can get in the supermarket which you point at the product and press a button?
  - o Could this be pointed at a hoop or ball and you either get a "ting" or "error".
  - o I think this could be a great project for an electronics student in one of the three universities near you? I have included Bath in the count because of their strong involvement in sport and I suspect they do a lot on inclusivity for parasport. Do you have an IT/Engineering boffin in your club who could lead on this?

If any of these suggestions "has legs" then perhaps the CA and/or Federation would consider a development grant? Let's find a way to start the (croquet) ball rolling.

#### **CPCC's Croquet Double Success**

In its 8<sup>th</sup> Year Camerton and Peasedown Croquet Club's Open Doubles Tournament became an International; as players from Wales joined others from local clubs and beyond to compete for this prestigious Trophy

As usual, the standard of play was very high – scoring hoops from an acute angle and clearing the opponent from a long distance. Although the games were competitive, good sportsmanship was the order of the day. Most games were won by 1 or 2 hoops, with many 7 - 6 results.

The day ended at 5.30pm, by then the 32 players had completed in a total of 96 matches, or 6 games each. There were clear winners – Linda Shaw and Dave Kibble retained the title - their 3rd win in the 8 years of the Tournament, as they won all their games. The trophy was presented by CPCC Chair, Fran Ralli and then there was an ample supply of tea and cakes

At the end of the day, everyone was asking 'what's the date for 2024'? Mo Boys, the Tournament Organiser, assured us that this Trophy will not only welcome everyone back in 2024, but she hoped for new players, attracting new faces and hoping for teams from the wider croquet world

#### West Country at the AC World Championship.

Dave Kibble was there and tells us about it:

The South West was well represented in the AC World Championship held in London mid-July. Of the 17 selected England places, eight went to players with connections to or roots in our region: Eugene Chang was a member at Bath, James Death (Cheltenham), Ed Duckworth (Bristol), Marcus Evans (Nailsea), Dave Kibble (Bristol), Richard Smith (Kington Langley & Bristol), Pete Trimmer (formerly of Bristol), Aston Wade (Budleigh); Duncan Reeve (Budleigh) played with a Scotland place.



Qualifiers under the England flag included Alison

Maugham (formerly Nailsea) and Robert Wilkinson (Bristol) (qualifier = won a place by winning in a week-long tournament immediately prior to the Championship itself). Only five of the 80 competitors were women, with four of them in the 19-person England squad and one representing Scotland. Of the four women representing England, two of them came in through the qualifier.

The event comprised three days of block play with the top four in their 10-player block going through to a knockout. Play was spread out over seven clubs in London, with competitors visiting a different club each day. I came equal fourth in my block with a top New Zealander, who beat me very comfortably in a play-off, even though I'd beaten him earlier in the week.

SWF chaps who qualified were Ed Duckworth, Robert Wilkinson, Marcus Evans, Aston Wade, and James Death, though only James survived the first round of the knockout before losing to the chap who stopped me from qualifying. James went on to win the Shield knockout (for players losing in the second round of the main knockout). Robert made it through to the second round of the Bowl knockout (for players losing in the first round of the main knockout). So, it was stiff competition all round, but what should one expect from a World Championship?

All of the main Championship matches played on Lawn 4 at Hurlingham were televised live on YouTube with full-time commentary and excellent camera work - catch up via the Croquet England YouTube channel.
