### Have you checked your handicaps?

Mike Rice is our Handicapping Officer and gives us this timely reminder:

It is an important winter duty of Club Handicappers to check the handicaps of all your playing members before the new season begins. Croquet England's guidelines include the following:

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"At a minimum the Club Handicapper should check

and sign off every club member's card at least once a year before the main season starts."

The SWF committee are planning to put the following proposal forward for a vote at the next AGM:

"For league matches (except Advanced League) all captains should present the handicap cards of their team before the start of the match This will give the opposing captain an opportunity to inspect."

Whilst this is not a league rule for 2024 it is certainly helpful and good practice for it to be done this season. Let's get into good habits early!

#### **AC Referees' Course**

Dave Kibble, Examining Referee, will lead this two-day AC Referee Course and examination which is provisionally scheduled for mid-March at Bristol Croquet Club. The course will develop your knowledge of the Laws and your ability to apply them to a competitive game. There will be a mix of time on the lawns for the practical aspects and indoors sessions.

In the meantime, this gives you an idea of what is involved:

The course is designed for those wishing to qualify as a Referee. Players who want to increase their knowledge of the Laws are encouraged to take the Assistant Referee examination as it is not onerous and helps the learning experience. Details of the qualification process can be found on the Croquet England website



Participants are expected to have a working knowledge of the AC Laws and will be expected to complete a small amount of preparatory material before the course.

The fee will be £30 which must be paid in advance. You will be sent an invoice for this. Those completing the course satisfactorily will be able to claim towards travel costs from the SWF Qualifications Bursary and a claim form will be sent to you after the event.

There is time to qualify up to six Assistant Referees and a separate, mutually convenient, half-day examination will be arranged for those who wish to qualify as Full Referee or if there is not time to complete all Assistant Referee examinations on the day.

- ✓ Read everything you're sent and be sure you understand it
  - In particular look out for any last-minute changes
- ✓ Arrive in good time to get settled and listen carefully to the Manager's briefing
- ✓ Know what the catering arrangements are
- ✓ Don't be afraid to ask for advice everyone was a first-timer once

But don't be intimidated into doing something you're not sure about – always check with the Manager

### Safeguarding in the SWF

Andru Blewett, our Safeguarding Officer, reminds us of our responsibilities with regard to both children and adults:

All member clubs of the South West Federation should now have a member nominated as your Welfare/Safeguarding Officer. If no member has offered to cover this role Croquet England takes the default position that the Club Chair fulfils the role.

Last year on-line training was rolled out for Child Safeguarding with further training for Adults at Risk to follow. In January Beatrice McGlen, CEO of Croquet England wrote to all Federation and Club Welfare/Safeguarding Officers giving details of the process to undertake this second phase.



I hope that most of you in this role have by now completed all this training.

With the transition to Croquet England complete with a new website, Safeguarding guidance and other information has been significantly updated and improved.

### **Player Dress Code**



The wearing of whites in competitive play has been a hot topic (for some) for a while and last year the South West Federation of Croquet Clubs received a request from a member club to review the requirement to wear whites in League Play.

Consultation with member clubs indicated a significant preference for wearing whites – sense of occasion, enhancing performance etc – alongside a clear understanding that this may be seen as off-putting or discriminatory for

Unless otherwise stated, the SWF follows CA (now CqE) Tournament Regulations which states: "... unless otherwise permitted, predominantly white clothing should be worn." Team colours are also permitted. https://www.croquet.org.uk/?p=tournament/regulations

The SWF is making use of this discretionary power and is not insisting on 'predominantly white' clothing at SWF events *viz* all League Play and the two Short Croquet Tournaments. However it is up to clubs to decide what dress code to require their teams to follow, and club teams should abide by their club's ruling.

### **Charity One-Ball**

I hope you've all got this in your diaries anyway, but Debbie James is administrator for this year's Charity 1 Ball series and has asked us to bring this to your attention.

The Charity 1-ball supported by Croquet England, is now well established on the croquet calendar and continuing into its eighteenth season. It will be played in 2024 in support of the British Heart Foundation. As is the tradition, competitors fashion their attire in the house colour of the chosen charity, so it's RED for '24. Visibility for the charity is the aim, so the louder the costume the better!



This fun day of 1-ball play (a hybrid of AC and GC, quick to play, easy to pick up, as skilful and strategic as you can make it) is well supported by clubs nationally. Each club or federation organises their heat in any format they desire, to generate qualifiers for the regional finals at Nottingham and Surbiton. But there is always room for more players, so if your club has not previously run a heat perhaps 2024 will be the year?

### A bit of background information:

This competition happens solely as a volunteer project with all clubs hosting heats and finals (Surbiton and Nottingham) doing so at no charge.

To date the competition has raised £71k for various charities. 41 heats were played last year, adding a magnificent £8k to that total. With your support let's keep the virtual accumulator rising higher towards £100k.

Debbie James, who is Chair of York CC, on the CqE Sports Development Committee and Course Secretary for the Northern Croquet Academy has taken over the administration of the event from Kevin Carter who instigated the competition 18 years ago, and who stepped down after the 2023 competition.

Monies raised are paid direct into York CC account, then transferred by the Treasurer direct to the nominated charity. All monies are accounted for transparently in this way.

#### **Federations' Forum**



Tony Mayer, Chair of the SWF, reports on the background of this Forum and some recent discussions.

There are nine federations of croquet clubs within Croquet England. They are: Croquet North in the north-east, Yorkshire, the North West, East Midlands, East Anglia, West Midlands, Croquet South East, Southern, and our own South West.

A few years ago, it was felt that there would be benefit in the Federations coming together in an informal discussion group to discuss matters of common concern, exchange views and best practice, learning from each other and collectively raising matters of concern and making representations to the Executive Board.

The Chairs and other representatives from all the Federations now meet regularly on the first Monday of the month (except for July, August and December). Initially, the Forum was convened by Paul Brown who continued to act in this capacity until his recent retirement from the Boards. Now the Forum is convened by our own Paul Francis as a member of the Croquet England Executive Board. Both Pauls are able to relay key 'take away' messages from our discussions to the Board.

Recently we have instituted a system of rotating chairs with the note-taker from one meeting then becoming the chair of the next session. Before each meeting, each Federation sends in a brief report of its activities often raising key questions which sets the agenda.

From time to time, the Forum has also held discussions with the President, the Chief Executive Officer and the National Safeguarding Officer as well as with other expert guests.

When comparing notes, the SWF, which has one of the largest memberships and covers the largest geographical region, is usually in the vanguard of new developments. For instance, our monthly Zoom meetings for clubs and their members and our lead in developing 'hybrid' coaching courses are two examples of SWF being in the lead nationally.

Over the past couple of years, the Forum has dealt with a wide variety of topics.

Naturally, the change from the CA to Croquet England and the implications for clubs and the Federations has been an almost constant agenda item. We have also covered the registration of trusts, the problems of recruiting people to serve on Federation committees, the decline of AC and how to reverse it, recruitment especially the Next Generation initiative (led by Paul Francis), handicapping (including the fairness of 'cross-over' handicaps between AC and GC raised by SWF), coaching (especially the SWF 'hybrid' schemes), and dress codes (again a SWF topic). Of course, Advantage GC, recruitment and safeguarding have tended to be constant themes. Recently, the Forum has raised the issue of data sharing between the 'centre' and the Federations as well as whether central subscriptions e.g. for Microsoft Teams, can be extended to the Federations.

All in all, the Forum provides a valuable place for the exchange of views and ideas from across the country, many of which will feed into actions at both the national and regional level.



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### **Swindon CC Grows and Grows**

Swindon Croquet Club has secured an extension to its Swindon Borough Council lease which means that their ambitious expansion plan can go ahead. As part of the Council's £6.3m Moredon Sporting Hub development, the club has been allocated an area of land to enable expansion from the existing three full lawns to five. So now it's all systems go!

There is much to be done, including erection of perimeter fencing, procurement of additional balls and hoops, levelling of ground and preparation of smooth lawn surfaces, along with installation of a storage unit and a players' shelter.



The Club has well established links with various community groups who regularly enjoy the facilities and the creation of the two additional lawns means that other community groups will also be accommodated and enjoy croquet sessions. Equipment, free tuition, and refreshments are always provided and a warm welcome is guaranteed.

Club Chair Clive Smith said:

"There is a lot of work ahead but this is certainly an exciting time for the club as we will be able to welcome new community groups and, of course, we are keen to attract new members. Croquet

provides gentle exercise, mental stimulation, and it's a competitive game but the emphasis at our club is always on enjoyment in a friendly, welcoming atmosphere. The Sporting Hub development at Moredon means our club will be far more visible and will attract far more interest from the Swindon community – it's all positive and very exciting!"

Having five lawns will provide other significant benefits, such as facilitating all-year-round play and the ability to host major national croquet tournaments - which will raise the club's profile.

Colin Bailey carried out sterling work in securing the lease extension and Steve Hares has offered to make trolleys to carry the additional hoops. This is typical of the willingness of members to contribute to the wellbeing of the club as time consuming tasks such as grass cutting, line painting, providing refreshments, clubhouse cleaning, general maintenance etc are all done 'in house', thereby enabling the club to thrive."



### **Reading Corner**

A little bit of 'a la recherche' this time and an up-to-date reflection from Debbie Lines.

This article from the Croquet Gazette in October 1992 – that's 30 years ago! – illustrates just how long this debate has been going, albeit with the greater awareness we have now of gender issues.

Debbie Cornelius (now Debbie Lines and current Women's AC World Champion) argues that croquet is a sport that women and men can play on equal terms and that special events are not needed. I asked her if her views had changed:

"Yes, my views have changed regarding Women's only events. This is almost entirely because of lawn speed and equipment.

Back in the 90's we almost always used to play on faster lawns. Most clubs didn't have sprinkler systems and we just seemed blessed with less rain, so lawns averaged around 12 Plummers. Also, the old Jaques balls were easier for big rolls, Dawsons don't roll as easily and therefore require more upper body strength.



As a result, the strength advantage enjoyed by most men was negligible and rarely of any significance in terms of who would win the game. These days, with lawns averaging 10 seconds at best, this is not the case.

I still believe our sport can and should be played mixed, and that we can compete on equal terms, at all except the very elite levels. For instance, let's say you are an AC 1 handicap, playing in a B level tournament (and there are now many of these), does it matter if you have that handicap because you are strong, old, tall, short, gifted, or because of how much you practice?

There are so many reasons why someone could get to that level and enjoy playing, and whether you are male or female is irrelevant.

But to get to say -2.5, now that gets tricky. I lose games sometimes because I don't have the strength to play a cut-rush the length of the lawn, or roll two balls to a boundary to make a good leave, or play the Hogan roll to pick up a standard TP. Over a season, I probably lose 2 or 3 games each year because of this - it's not a lot, but it adds up when trying to be the best."

She added: "Good luck! I suspect you may find this subject quite lively "

Many thanks Debbie for bringing us up to speed with your thinking. Do let us have your views and experiences of this – whatever your gender.
