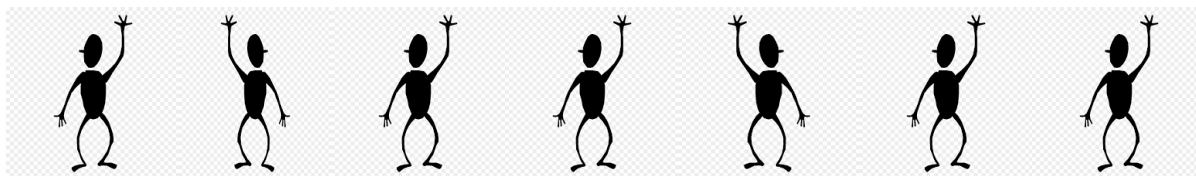
In the meantime, read on and enjoy the winter months.

## Steve Leonard – East Dorset CC

Steve has been a croquet member of East Dorset since 2019. Soon after his arrival, he offered to take over as the Croquet Section's Grounds Member. Committed, resourceful and highly energetic, he has been a tower of strength ever since and in particular over the past 12 months.

While Steve's principal responsibilities are management and oversight, he is more than willing to roll up his sleeves and carry out any task that needs doing. He has an excellent relationship with the club groundsman, and they work alongside each other extremely well.

When the groundsman took paternity leave in April (a key time for the lawns), Steve willingly stepped in to take over the routine daily tasks, spending more than three hours at the club each day dealing with a multitude of issues. Admirably, it took no prompting or encouragement from others - he just took it all on and did an excellent job, which is testament to his selflessness and sense of duty.

Full of ideas and determined to provide top-quality facilities for the members, one of Steve's recent initiatives has been to instigate a regular weekly maintenance period. This was not universally popular amongst the members as it takes all the courts out of use for a couple of hours. But it has proved to be extremely successful, helping to improve court conditions and ensure more efficient use of the groundsman's hours.

Another key achievement has been the instigation of a major refurbishment programme. Largely his initiative and introduced as a result of his persuasive advocacy, one of the club's five courts is being taken out of use each year in order to carry out extensive improvements to the grass and playing surfaces. It is a programme that has required detailed planning, negotiation with contractors and work within committees. To his credit, Steve has managed it all - alongside the constant need to deal with a myriad of short-notice changes and problems - with considerable aplomb, and the improvements to the courts are already clearly evident.

Steve's task has not been easy, especially this year. East Dorset is a multi-sport club and there are many more tennis members and padel players than croquet members, so ensuring croquet gets its fair share of funds and maintenance time is a constant challenge. But Steve, who sits on the club's Grounds Committee, has handled this delicate task with energy and maturity, securing appropriate and much-needed support from both the Grounds Committee and the Club Board, and thus ensuring the longer-term quality of the croquet facilities.

We are very lucky to have Steve in the role. How he manages the task alongside all the other stuff he does, not least his competitive croquet (he has played 200 GC ranking games in the past 12 months) is anyone's guess. But we are very thankful that he keeps all his plates spinning with such skill, efficiency, and dedication



## Silke Bruening – Moreton in Marsh



Silke joined the club in the early days after retiring from running her very smart tea room in Moreton in Marsh. It was my favourite place to meet up with friends on a Saturday morning. Silke did some of her training at The Dorchester Hotel.

She was introduced to the club by a friend. She wasn't terribly keen to try the game but after one session she was hooked.

Our biggest fund-raising event is providing teas at Chastleton Church, which is adjacent to Chastleton House, a National Trust property. These events take place approximately once a month and this year £6,000 has been raised so far.

Silke is in charge of the team and works tirelessly getting the team together and organising, which cakes she requires for the day. She cuts the cakes into slices or squares and keeps a record of how many pieces we have so that we know approximately how much will be made if we sell everything. One day we had one slice of fruit cake left which had to be shared by two of our customers. We all know now that once a slice has been served, we have to turn the cake round so that people can see the inside of the cake. So strict is her training of us.

Apart from all the above she makes cakes for us when we host visiting teams and when we host visitors. She has also been instrumental recently in organising a new kitchen unit which completes the kitchen end of our clubhouse. She works tirelessly for the club and I hope she will be considered for this award.

Clare has been a fully committed member at Bath Croquet Club for many years. She uses her numerous skills to add to the enjoyment of others whilst they are at the club.

With Alan, her partner, she has been instrumental in preparing and caring for our flower beds in and around the lawns, recently creating a flowerbed to include various species of plant that give interest across the year. ## **Budleigh Salterton, Short Croquet Open Tournament: The Rosemary Bradshaw Salver**

Coming to the end of another season this tournament was a must to try. First played in 2017, although not fully subscribed only 24 players this year out of a maximum of 32.

The lawns were superb, weather was fantastic for the beginning of October and the tournament manager, Chris, Donovan had everything in place.

The 24 players were split into three blocks giving you seven games initially over the two days handicaps, ranging from 10 down to 4 peels. Three of the previous winners, Jonathan Powe, Dave Kibble, and Karl Brown were in the lineup

At the end of the block play Fred Williams and Jane Turner (both from Llanfairfechan in North Wales) won their blocks and yours truly won his. Carl Brown from Bradford on Avon Club was given the fourth spot in the semi-final for having won six of his seven matches.

The semifinals saw Carl playing Fred with Carl winning after a very close game.

The other semifinal was between Brent and Jane with Brent coming out the winner after another very close fought match.

The final between Carl and Brent who both had a disastrous first 10mins (maybe because of the eyes and silence of the experienced crowd of onlookers) but Brent eventually got his act together and went on to win 14-5.

## **SWF Autumn Short Croquet Team Tournament: Budleigh Salterton 3<sup>rd</sup>- 5<sup>th</sup> October**

We arrived at Budleigh for the 10<sup>th</sup> staging of the SWF Short Croquet Team Tournament, to find the lawns in their usual pristine condition with the prospect of some enjoyable yet competitive croquet. After a late withdrawal, there were 29 teams competing, Division 5 having only four teams. Chris Donovan once again took on the managerial duties.



## Division 1

Nailsea Trendlewood were the winners, regaining the title which they lost in 2024 under dubious circumstances, when weather washed out play after lunch and the management used a complicated calculation to ascertain the winners. Kington Langley Aardvarks, the winners last year, were second this time around.

After three rounds, Kington Langley Bruins were one ahead of Nailsea Trendlewood, but sitting out Round 4. Aardvarks were one point further behind and playing Trendlewood in Round 4. A 2-2 draw was ultimately enough, and Trendlewood went on to beat Bruins 3-1 in the final round to confirm their championship win. Bristol Boys gained the two points needed in the last round to draw level with Taunton Terriers, who were sitting out, so a shoot-out ensued, which the Boys won and Terriers are relegated.

## Division 2



From Round 1 this was always a contest between Bristol Allsorts and Bath Salts. After the first round, Allsorts had 4 wins against Salts 3. In Round 2 they played each other in a 2-2 draw, and each team won three points in the third round. Salts were then sitting out and Allsorts had a slight hiccup when they lost 1-3 to Glamorgan Bards.

Therefore in Round 5 Salts needed a 3-1 win against a struggling Budleigh Salterton Roquets, but could only achieve a 2-2 draw, necessitating a shoot-out. In the end, Allsorts won hitting the peg with the last shot of the eight. Budleigh Salterton Roquets are indeed the yo-yo team, relegated in 2023, promoted in 2024 but relegated again this year.

### Division 3

Once again, we had an exciting two-horse race to the title. East Dorset and Sidmouth Blackmore, set out with significant wins in the first two rounds, and when they drew with each other in Round 3, Blackmore were two points ahead but sitting out Round 4. East Dorset won three points in this round, so entered the last round one point ahead. Then they opened the door for Blackmore as they lost the final round 1-3 to Budleigh Salterton Mallets.



This was enough to save Mallets from relegation, but it also meant that Blackmore could tie with two wins or win with three. Unfortunately for them they also lost 1-3 to an already relegated Nailsea, and East Dorset took the Division 3 trophy and promotion to Sunday play next year.

### Division 4

This was an exciting contest for both promotion and relegation, requiring shoot-outs to decide both. Unfortunately, the promotion battle ended in some controversy. Bath Buns were a player short and played a guest who was also playing for another team on another day. This made them ineligible for promotion, although under the rules, they could win the trophy as division winners.

After three rounds, Bath Buns were leading with 10, but sitting out the final round, Taunton Tiggers had 9 and Blewbury were on 7. These two had to play each other in the final round, and Blewbury won 3-1, resulting in a three-way tie on 10 points. Because they were sitting out the last round, three of the Buns players had left, leaving only their guest. One Blewbury player had also left.

It was decided that one player from each team would take part in the shoot-out, and Bath subsequently won, with Tiggers coming second and, due to Buns' ineligibility, gained promotion.

Also, Bradford on Avon and Tisbury were tied on 3 wins after Round 4, and they were due to play each other. A 2-2 draw required another shoot-out and this was won by Bradford on Avon, so Tisbury are relegated.

A surprise 0-4 defeat in the third round to Sidmouth Connaught, was the final straw for Avening, and Coyotes had won the division by the end of this round.

There being only four teams in the division meant no relegated team this year.

Similarly a 2-2 draw between Glamorgan Druids and Lym Valley, left them one and two points behind Rushes respectively, when either of them could have won or tied with a different result.

## Obituaries

We note with sadness, two great losses to the croquet world.

**John Airey: 1938 – 2025** – the first ever Croquet Association Diploma awardee

John Airey is synonymous with the Swindon Croquet Club as he was our longest-serving member having been in at the start of the club when it played on one lawn in front of the Grade 1 listed Lydiard House in which the low branches of the nearby cedar tree acted as the 'clubhouse'.

John took a leading part in its relocation by the Borough Council to its present site at the Moredon Sporting Hub. In those days, an old container served as both the equipment store and the Committee Room

John, an engineer with his distinctive West Midlands accent, who loved working with his hands, was a tower of strength, particularly in those early days, fitting out the container with benches and storage areas, together with shelves for storing everything from croquet balls to bisques, markers and all the necessary accoutrements of a croquet club. John made the trolleys for the hoops, bisques, markers, AC hoop clips, corner flags and much of the equipment that we still use today nearly 30 years later.

When the club expanded to three lawns and obtained a major grant from Sports England (plus support from the Croquet Association) to relay the lawns, provide a clubhouse, ground maintenance equipment and a clubhouse, John was again at the forefront of this development. It is only fitting that the clubhouse, for which he made the trophy cabinet, was named the John Airey Clubhouse in recognition of his role in the club's development.

But John was not just contributing with his hands and expertise but he also took a major role in the club's administration serving on its committee for many years and guiding its development..

On the croquet lawns, John was a keen and very good AC player and coach always encouraging members to try AC. The AC 'roll-up' day always saw John and his partner, Di, present and playing and aiding others to improve their skills. At the turn of the millennium, John was a key member of the Swindon's winning team which twice won the South West Federation's AC Federation League.

John was a constant presence at the club, if not in his whites then in his overalls, servicing all the machinery and making new additions to our facilities. He must have had a sweet tooth as the shelves are still full of old Quality Street tins and ice cream containers now full of screws, bolts, oily rags and many other useful things!

Something for which John will be remembered was his work for charity and for helping disabled, especially children, running courses in croquet, both indoors and outdoors for them. He invented and made special adjustable mallets for wheelchair users which he also provided to other clubs. Each year, he and Di organised a GC competition to raise money for their favourite charity – the Wiltshire Air Ambulance that usually resulted in an annual donation of more than £400.

John's role and activism was at the heart of the club's reputation as very much a 'community' club.

He was always very self-effacing with regard to these activities and would not let himself be nominated for any recognition. However, when the Diploma scheme was initiated by the CA in 2000, the Swindon Club

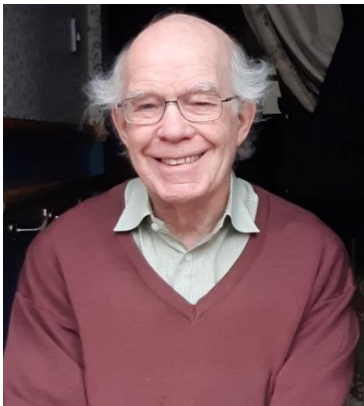
nominated John, despite his reluctance, and he became the first awardee of the scheme with the citation that "John has made a tremendous contribution to the club. He coaches beginners, paints hoops, makes trolleys for carting equipment, writes the club's newsletters, runs tournaments, gets us publicity in local newspapers and is a very active committee member."

His passing marks an end of an era for the Swindon Croquet Club – he will be sadly missed by the club and by croquet in general.

## **Roger Jenkins 1942 - 2025**



Roger was a stalwart figure both at Bristol and regionally. His croquet playing days were cut short when he became disabled, but for many years after that, he remained a staunch supporter of the club, enjoyed our tournaments - and the lunches they offered - and was never slow to offer his advice to players.

*Ray Ransom* opens the remembrance of Roger's journey into croquet, which began in 1982 when he enrolled in a beginners' course at Bristol Croquet Club. Roger soon demonstrated a talent for the game and went on to win the beginners' competition, beating a young Mark Suter in the final.

He was certainly smitten with croquet and played as often as he could, entering tournaments and playing in matches for Bristol teams. But it wasn't just playing, he played a full part in the administration of the Bristol Club and for many years arranged club matches. He also played a full part in the club's end-of-year on-lawn and club maintenance. On one occasion, we hired a machine to spread top dressing on the lawns. Roger was keen to operate the spreader, and all went well until he got too close to the edge of lawn two. Roger managed to eject from the seat, but the machine wasn't so lucky and disappeared over the edge, falling 4 feet onto the adjacent lawn. Fortunately, Roger was unhurt.

Watching Roger in play was often interesting. One time watching his play during the Counties, Ray was horrified to see him approach 1-back with both opponents' balls in baulk, at opposite ends of the lawn. Roger made 1-back, took off to the ball in B-baulk, putting that ball safe with a huge roll that finished close enough to roquet the ball in A-baulk and move that into the lawn. The disappointment on the faces of the opponents was clear to see.

I will miss my courtside conversations with Roger, where we discussed, out of earshot, the play going on on the lawns, and the Bristol Club members will certainly miss the help he willingly gave to help them improve their play.

Roger had a remarkable record outside of Bristol Croquet Club, as Chris Williams reminds us, playing his first ranking games in 1987 and his last one in 2010. During this time, he played 1165 ranking games – winning 54% of these and peaking with a highest World Ranking of 89 in 2004.

He made many appearances in Inter-County Championships for Avon and Somerset, winning on many occasions and made two appearances in the winning Bristol team of the national Inter-Club in 2004 and 2007.

He played in the 2009 World Championship at West Palm Beach, made eight appearances in the Spencer Ell Cup (Third Eight) and one appearance in the Treasurer's Tankard (Fourth Eight).

His tournament record was impressive, winning:

- Isle of Wight Championship 1998
- Cheltenham Challenge Cup (July Week) 2000, 2004 and 2007
- Veterans Rothwell Cup 2007
- Budleigh Colman Cup (August Week) 2008 and 2009

Tributes have been received from croquet players across the region, fondly remembering both his play and his conversation.

*Marcus Evans recalls:* Roger was one of the first A-class players I got to know. I admired his relaxed, simple style of both play and tactics, which was extremely effective, especially at the AC Inter-Counties where he was an ever-present member of the Avon (and then Somerset) teams for about 20 years.

We shared a lot of laughs both on and off the courts. On one particularly memorable occasion, we were (for some reason) discussing the then-new fad of speed dating, somebody was saying "so you get 10 minutes with each date..." when Roger loudly interrupted "No, it's five!".

Roger is also one of the relatively few players to be immortalised with a term of croquet jargon, after taking a long lift shot on a particularly wet lawn and failing to hit it hard enough to reach the target. He was not the first or only player to do this, in fact we know this because the reason it has passed into legend is he had witnessed another player do the same just a few minutes before. Thus, we have the "Jenkins error".

I'm sorry we've shared our last croquet lawn, cup of tea, and pint of beer, Roger. Thanks for the memories.

*While John McCullough remembers:* I think Roger was one of the graduates of my first coaching courses at the club - part of a distinguished cast including Donald & Rosemary Guban and Frances & Ray Ransom.

I played with or against Roger many times. He was a skilful and mentally strong player - always tough to beat and always likely to stage a comeback if he was behind. He was, more importantly, a good friend and sportsman.

I recall he played a major part in the Phase 1 renovation of the clubhouse.

So sorry to read this sad news, *says Paul Pristavec.* Roger was, for several years, Bristol club's contact for arranging fixtures. He was always on the ball, and there was no faffing about sorting fixtures. It was in the days before the explosion of GC leagues!

Although I have only known Roger for fifteen years, I will remember him in many ways, *says Bob Whiffen.* Soon after joining the club, I was on the club Committee with him, and his comments were always brief and to the point. That was when I found out that he clearly loved AC but not GC.

Around ten years ago, I found it character-building to play in both club competitions and club tournaments when Roger and one or two other experienced members were spectators because I knew that at some point I would hear a comment such as 'what is he doing now?'.

More recently, Roger was the person who introduced me to Level play with Advanced rules and inspired me to play in as many tournaments as possible against similar or better opposition because that was the way that he improved his game. I will always be thankful to him for this because I really enjoy them. As part of the process, he kindly sat and watched several games that I played and often his summary of the game started with the words 'well, neither of you deserved to win' but would then follow up with helpful advice.

I, and many other members of Bristol Croquet Club, will miss his presence.

One of my best Roger stories, *says Chris Williams,* was at Bristol about 15-20 years ago I was playing at Bristol on a warm summer afternoon - I think it was a Bristol v Dyffryn advanced match, and there was a guy having problems fixing some tiles on the roof of the house on the corner opposite the club. In the end, Roger gave up watching - went over, climbed up the ladder onto the roof and sorted it himself.

*John McCullough's* words are a fitting end to this tribute: It is bittersweet that it should be his passing that brings back such happy memories.
